Dear friends,

I am writing this piece towards the end of Christian Aid Week. I would like to say a **sincere ‘thank you’** to everyone in the Church and the Parish for supporting this year’s appeal – ‘God’s Kingdom is Stronger than the Storms’, which focussed particularly on the needs of the people of Haiti. It is a good thing when people of all sorts join together to work, give and pray to help those who are poorest in our world. It brings hope and comfort to our neighbours, who, even if far away, will be encouraged by our compassion for them. It is good to help people to help themselves out of poverty and live safer and more secure lives.

The Lord’s Prayer contains these words “**Your Kingdom come, Your will be done**” (Matthew 6:10), which Jesus taught his disciples when they asked him for help with how to pray. When we pray this prayer obediently we are asking God for help to equip and guide us as to how to do his Kingdom’s work here on earth.

Jesus said that “**The kingdom of heaven** is like a mustard seed which a person took and planted in their field” (Matthew 5:31). Although a mustard seed is one of the smallest seeds on earth (only 1-2mm in diameter) it grows to become a large plant. The bushes reach an average mature height of between 6 and 20 feet with a 20-foot spread, although exceptional plants can reach 30 feet tall under ideal conditions. That is quite some growth! Jesus uses the example of the mustard seed to tell us how God’s Kingdom can grow and flourish. If we unite in faith with others in doing small things, even small acts of kindness and generosity can grow into something far beyond our imagination.

The **community** here at St Thomas’ is made up of a wide variety of people – all ages, well and not so well, young and old in faith, with many different life experiences. I would like to think that we are an example of a lively community who respect and value each other and work together towards a common vision. Working to bring God’s Kingdom in is an important part of that vision and is seen in the work we do in our local community as well as further afield. (If you would like to know more about what we do, go to our website or search for us on Facebook or Twitter).

Working together is a biblical mode of activity and you would be most welcome to join with us in the things we are doing. Come and visit the Centre and find out more about what activities are available to enjoy there, not to mention sampling the great food and drink on offer. If you have any suggestions as to what new things you think we might be involved in please do get in touch.

Last, but definitely not least, you are most warmly invited to come and join us for worship on a Sunday. HOPE HOUSE

Repair work has not yet started but should do so soon.

Most of the previous residents are now in stable long term accommodation and are doing well.

Please note at the moment we are **unable to accept** donations of goods as we have no storage – any money donations will still be gratefully accepted at the centre.

A wish list of items needed will be produced once we are able to access the building again.

This is our latest Heritage inspired activity. Jane Simmonds and Karen Herrick have put together a very interesting programme based around the various aspects of heritage in the church - the whole church – the clock – the people who work in church – music – -the windows – celebrations.

A small number of people have gathered over 6 weeks to consider the theme, describe memories associated with the theme, do a piece of art work which has then been inserted into their own scrapbook, having a hard cover which has also been decorated. A number of volunteers have assisted with recording the memories and typing them up so they can be inserted into the scrapbooks. The session has then finished with a very sociable and enjoyed soup lunch, provided by the cafe.

For the whole church session members focussed on memories of home and what home means to them. They did a paper collage for a background and then stuck on a house of their design – which may have shown aspects of previous homes they have lived in.

The clock session related to any memorable clocks – be they gifts, or ones that meant clocking on and off at work, or large scale clocks – like the one on St Thomas' tower. The art piece was a stencil of clocks and numbers done with dye packs and sponges.

We were ably assisted by David Mouncer for the session about people who work in church and looked at some of the varying attire that a vicar may use in his day to day activities. This sparked much discussion about uniforms and work that people had done throughout their lives. The participants did an acrylic paint roller background and then stamped patterns / flowers onto this – the following week when it was dry they traced round their hands on the patterned paper.

The music session was by far the liveliest – singing and dancing in

abundance! Adam Parrish played the organ at the start of the session which was much appreciated. We had a whole variety of recorded music and many recitals of favourite tunes. Memories were abundant of dance music and dance halls, singing in various choirs, and the many aspects of life that music permeates. For the art activity a card “record” was cut out and placed in a decorated sleeve.

For the window session we took inspiration from the magnificent windows in the church and talked about the views people had had from a variety of windows – in their homes or when on holiday. We did paper collages and stamped images of windows onto them.

We have not yet completed the series – but I am sure it will be a great celebration to end a fascinating series of meetings.

Andy, Ann, Beatrice, Dawn, Kevin, Pauline, Sylvia, Winifred and myself have all enjoyed the meetings and have learned a lot about each other and about aspects of Chesterfield, and particularly Brampton, over the years.

A huge thank you must go to Jane Simmonds, Karen and Phil Herrick for all the thought and preparation that has made each session so interesting and such a success.

The Passage of Time

How many of us during the Sunday services spare a thought for the clock that is steadily ticking away above our heads in the tower? We may notice it chime at the hour (or wish that it would chime if the preacher is going on a bit too long!) but most of the time (forgive the pun) we are oblivious to the clock. I recently had the opportunity to accompany Churchwarden Mark Hoare as he climbed the tower stairs to wind up the clock. The clock has to be wound every week and this is usually done by Phil Riley but Mark was standing in for Phil whilst he was on holiday.



The clock is powered by two weights suspended within the tower on long cables. One weight drives the 'going train' – the mechanism that measures the passage of time and moves the hands - and the other drives the striking train to strike the hours. The job of winding the clock involves winding a crank to raise each weight in turn back up to the top of the tower. The lighter going train weight is relatively easy to wind and requires 56 turns of the crank to fully raise it. The much heavier striking train weight is a real brute to wind and takes 69 strenuous turns of the crank to raise it.

The clock was installed in the tower in October 1920 by Joseph Haslam as a thanks offering for the safe return of his two sons from World War 1. Since 1920 the clock has been wound over 5,000 times. Mark told me that as the clock was designated as a Public Clock (i.e. there for the benefit of the general public) the Council used to employ a clock-winder to visit St Thomas' every week to wind the clock. The next nearest public clock was at that time the Market Hall – so the St Thomas' clock provided the growing local community with a vital and much closer public clock. Household clocks were scarce at the time. Nowadays the winding is done on a voluntary basis.

The clock chimes out the hours by striking a bell that weighs about 250kg (4 to 5cwt) and is designed to be heard at least a quarter of a mile away. Each day the bell is struck 216 times so during its life it has been struck over 7 million times!

If you know anything of the clock's history, or have any interesting anecdotes, please get in touch with me. Tony Witham (01246 206820) I would like to be able to write a longer article about our faithful clock that has told the time to Brampton for nearly a hundred years.

General Data Protection Regulation.

At the end of May new legislation comes into force which takes over from current Data Protection law. The new law is a lot more strict, particularly for anyone holding sensitive personal information (which includes religious affiliation).

Personal information is any information that can identify a person, and includes names, addresses, contact numbers, email addresses, etc

From the end of May we are legally **allowed** to hold personal information if:

- the person is aware and happy that we are holding it, and they understand why we are holding it (eg to communicate changes in group times)
- we are holding it for a specific reason (eg they belong to a group and we need to contact them if a group is cancelled etc)
- the information is up to date
- the information is kept safe

Thank you to all of you who have completed forms in Church giving the details you are happy for us to hold and how you wish us to communicate with you.

As magazine editor I hold a list of addresses for distributors to deliver your magazine each month. If you are no longer happy that this is the case and wish to collect the magazine please let me know.

At the moment this seems to be a difficult topic to ensure we get right, but you can be assured that every effort is being made that we comply with the new regulations and keep your data safe.

Thank you to Sally-Anne Beecham for information and all her hard work in ensuring that as a church we have taken the necessary steps to comply with these new regulations.

Prayer for Thy Kingdom Come

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement, which invites Christians around the world to pray between Ascension and Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. What started out as an invitation from the Archbishops' of Canterbury and York in 2016 to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer.

churches will hold prayer events, such as 24-7 prayer, prayer stations and prayer walks, across the UK and in other parts of the world;

people will be empowered through prayer by the Holy Spirit, finding new confidence to be witnesses for Jesus Christ.

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses ...to the ends of the earth. When he had said this...he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight...Then they returned to Jerusalem ... and were constantly devoting themselves to prayer...

When the day of Pentecost had come they were all together in one place... All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit... and that day about three thousand persons were added." Acts 1,2
